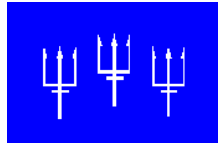

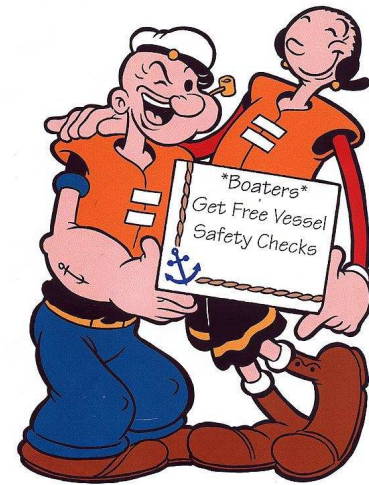
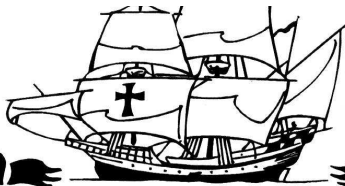

Fort Vancouver's Fishin' Folk



A Reel People excursion to the I-5 sturgeon fishing hole was our official kick off for sturgeon activity on the Columbia. *Odyssey*, crewed by Al & Rosemary Griggs, Ed & Nancy Bettencourt and Gayle & Zach Zachariasen; *Tom & Jerri*, crewed by Tom & Jerri MacGregor (go figure); and *Harvester* crewed by Lloyd, Edie & Andy Brannon anchored out. Six or 7 shakers were caught on *Tom & Jerri*, 2 on *Odyssey* and 1 on *Harvester*. The best action was reported later in the day by Jon & Kathy Kolstad and Janett Chandler. *Real Pleasure* while still moored at Steamboat Landing brought in several shakers and a 44" keeper. Rumors have the fish being kept alive in the Chandler's bathtub where they are feeding it daily in hopes of entering it in a sturgeon derby! Nah!

Lloyd & Zach fished Merwin Reservoir on *Harvester* for 7 ½ hours. Lloyd landed 5 kokanee and Zach landed 3. Merwin is very fishable and the fish are cooperating.

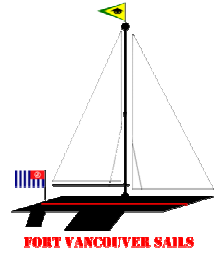
May 4th sturgeon fishing at the west end of Lemon Island was something else. The fast water and high wind were a challenge to any fisherman. After 2-3 hours and only one small shaker, Lloyd, Zach & Gayle decided to throw in the towel but Chuck Rudkin and his friend, Bob, anchored on *Jillie Bean*, decided to stay out longer. After *Fancie Annie* left the area, *Jillie Bean* was attacked by a large river monster disguised as a log. While freeing *Jillie Bean* from the anchor line, Chuck got some great pictures and survived to tell the story at the Reel People breakfast the following day.

Kathy Kolstad and Janett Chandler stayed at Steamboat Landing again and enjoyed the sheltered area of the dock. They caught several shakers. They also caught a large whiskery orange fish with a large mouth, identified as a bull head catfish.

Thousands of fish crossing the dam is a welcome sign that the springer run is not as gloomy as predicted. Columbia shad fishing runs May 16, 2006 - March 31, 2007.

WatchOut

The water is running high and swift. Post a lookout to watch for **debris**, including full size trees that have been washed from the shoreline into the current. As these objects become waterlogged, they often sink below the surface, sometimes lodging at one end into the bottom of the river creating what is termed a "deadhead". A seemingly small piece of wood may hide something far more substantial below.

Warm, sunny weekends bring out the homeowner in all of us. Exercise caution when boating near or downriver from floating homes. **Debris** that has accumulated against the floats and decking of these homes on water often get pushed into the current by industrious owners. Everything except the kitchen sink seems to be fair game so keep your eyes open.

Wing dams may seem to have disappeared, but they are right where they were last year. A wing dam is a manmade barrier, a series of pilings that extends out from the shoreline partway into the river. These pilings are placed just inches apart. Their height is never consistent due to wear, but they are always there. The purpose of a wing dam is to keep the channel clear by forcing water into a fast-moving center while holding back sediment, thereby reducing the rate of sediment accumulation in the channel. Most, but not all, have a taller piling or dolphin (series of tall pilings tied together at the top) at the end. Wing dams create a hydraulic, a backwash that traps and recirculates. **NEVER** boat or swim near the upriver side of a wing dam. **NEVER** pass over a wing dam or attempt to pass between the pilings of a wing dam. **ALWAYS** pass the piling or dolphin marking the outside end of a wing dam on the outer edge... never on the shore side. **KNOW** how a wing dam is marked on your chart; a straight line extending from shore with a small dot at the end. There are over 350 wing dams on the Columbia River between the mouth of the river and Bonneville Dam. Every year wing dams trap or impale boats that pass over these structures. During high water they may be hidden, but **they are always there**.

Columbia River boating is a wonderful adventure. Be aware and you will be safe. Read your charts and keep your eyes open... you'll avoid danger and not miss a moment of the spectacular beauty that surrounds us.

For those new to the river, Sand Island is located directly across from St Helen's City Dock (St Helens Oregon). You have two options to get there. The fast route will take you approximately 20 miles downriver on the Columbia from Vancouver. If the water is rough, or you just want to take your time and see some sights, you can leave the Columbia at Kelley Point, just past Red Buoy 47. Once on the Willamette, head upriver to just past Red Buoy 12 where you will turn starboard and enter the Multnomah Channel. The Channel is 19 miles long and slow going most of the way as you would be passing numerous floating home communities and docks. You will exit the Channel, again on the Columbia River, just downriver from St Helens.

If you have any questions or need some extra guidance for navigating to this cruise, please give me a call. We'll be standing by to assist you in docking and promise you a great time. See you on the docks!

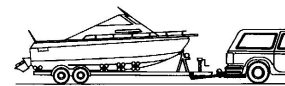

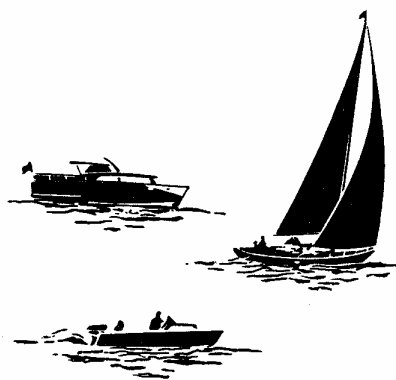

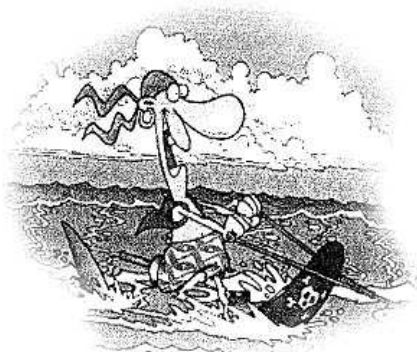
